

1 Greens Gunyah Museum

Discover unique collections including Brookong Station, The Doris Golder Wool Art Gallery, Tim Fischer Exhibition and Jackson Strong Display.

Click Go the Shears, by Stuart Spragg

Located high on the wall this two-dimensional artwork depicts a shearing shed with two shearers shearing sheep.

Thank your Mother for the Rabbits, by David Fenwick

This is a rusty bicycle, built to scale, with four sculptural rabbits on the ground in front, made from horseshoes with plough tines for ears.

Good Old Days, by Keith Simpson

Winner of the 2010 National Farm Art Award at the Spirit of the Land Festival.

My Waratah, by Raeleen Pfeiffer

Winner of the 2014 Contemporary Sculpture Awards at the Spirit of the Land Festival, this stunning piece was selected for the town by His Excellency General The Honourable David Hurley AC DCS (Retd), Governor General of NSW.

Walk of Fame

A tribute to the remarkable accomplishments of former residents of Lockhart Shire who have shaped Australia's rich history and heritage.

Native Waratah, by Matt Bye

This rusted core ten steel Waratah stands two metres high and has a flower made from multiple small triangles.

Cubed, by Matt Bye

Made from rusted laser cutting waste and is balanced on a point on a half metre high pyramid.

Going to the Dance, by Stuart Spragg

This captivating sculpture was awarded highly commended at the 2014 Spirit of the Land Festival.

8 The 9 Martyrs, by John Wood

The discs on this sculpture represent the nine shearers imprisoned with hard labour following the 1888 Brookong Station Shearer's Riot between shearers and the pastoralist 'wool kings'.

The Eagle, by Stuart Taylor

This majestic eagle perched high above native grasses ready to swoop. Donated to the community in 2014.

Lockhart Love Locks

Where better to leave a love lock than at the Lockhart Love Locks. A fun and interactive way to remember your visit, there's even a quaint Wishing Well for your key.

Bunyip of Burra Creek, by Sean Meany

The Bunyip of Burra Creek is a cheeky character who was also the winning sculpture at the 2018 Spirit of the Land Festival.

Peace, by Colin Wiese

Donated to the community by the artist, this amazing sculpture is dedicated to the memory of the spirit of rural people affected by war, and to the establishment of a lasting peace in the world.

Inland Pelicans, by Bob Teasdale

Winner of the EE 'Curly' Heckendorf Award at the 2015 Spirit of the Land Festival, this wonderful bird sculpture commemorates the site of the Lockhart Bird Aviary which graced Hodgson Park.

The Mob, by David Doyle

One of many sculptures donated to the town by Lockhart & District Community Bendigo Bank, this fantastic display of a mob of bounding kangaroo.

Current National Farm Art Award

Each year the Winner of the National Farm Art Award is displayed next to the entrance of the Caravan Park. See Information Centre for more information.

Heritage Verandahs and Etched Pavers

Wander under historic Federation verandahs, read the stories of original shopfronts and discover more than 400 etched pavers, artistically displaying a visual record of the social history of Lockhart and district.

Get Around Back, by Stuart Spragg

Winner of the 2008 National Farm Art Award at the Spirit of the Land Festival, this sculpture reflects a typical Australian working sheep yard.

18 Rusty Cockatoo, by Sean Meany

Winner of the Spirit of the Land's 2015 National Farm Art Award captures the characteristics of the majestic cockatoo.

19 Lockhart Water Tower, by Scott Nagy and Janne Birkner

Depicting a cascading waterfall surrounded by many of the unique native fauna and flora found in the local landscape.

20 Emu Family, by Stuart Taylor

Set in the CWA Park, the finely detailed Emu Family reflects the iconic Australian animal which can be found in the West of Lockhart Shire.

Horse Power, by Stuart Taylor

Winner of the 2011 National Farm Art Award at the Spirit of the Land Festival, this life size horse sculpture is made from recycled farm metal.

Bonnie Dog, by Stuart Taylor

Winner of the 2012 National Farm Art Award at the Spirit of the Land Festival. This sculpture captures the moment a dog responds to a call for attention.

Come in Spinner, by David Fenwick

Located inside the Bendigo Bank is from the 2017 Festival. The sculpture is called "Come in Spinner" and depicts a 1914 and 1939 penny.

- Pioneer Memorial Gates Lockhart Show Ground
 This tribute to the early settlers includes twenty-two life sized replica bales of wool forming the columns of the entrance gates each bear the stencilled wool brand of the district's original sheep stations. Unveiled in 1962, this unique Memorial was built with funds provided by the descendants of those very pioneers.

- Pastoral Shadow of Brookong
 A circular walk that takes you on a pictorial trail of Lockhart's history

 Over seven metres tall created in 2011 from workshops
